The Sermon by Rev Howard Wright

Read 1 Corinthians 1.3-9 and Mark 13.24-37. Jesus will Return

When we gave chocolate advent calendars to our Grandchildren, they started to open them. They would have eaten all the chocolates immediately. Surely Christmas is now – to them everything is now!

Why isn't it Christmas now? And yet it is Christmas now, in the shops, and in many homes. It's just not Christmas day yet.

In Jesus' prophecy we see it's now, but also it's not yet – Jesus has come, but he's not come in glory yet. The kingdom is here and now, and we have the decorations and celebrations, but it's not yet Jesus' return.

We are to watch. Jesus tells us to be on our guard (Mark 13:9, 23, & 33), to watch (vs. 5, 35, & 37), and to be alert (v. 33) because the time 'is near, right at the door.' (v.29).

This story starts in v.1 of Mark 13. Jesus is leaving the temple. 'Look', say his disciples, 'what massive stones, what a magnificent building.' Yet, Jesus says, 'Not a stone will be left.' And continues to speak of his coming.

The disciples were looking at the building; by far and away the largest building they would ever have seen. Consider the magnificence of Winchester cathedral, though this is now surrounded by other large buildings, imagine it in the first centuries of its life with just timber framed houses cluttered around it – it would have appeared vast in comparison.

The temple was such a confidence boost for the Jewish people, a source of great national pride, a symbol of their supreme, almighty God and his care for them as a special people. It was dependable, immoveable, eternal, secure, and an inspiration – all is well, and will be well.

What are we looking at today? What in our communities or personally inspires pride and sense of security in us today? Our church building, our finances, possessions, our houses (our 'Englishman's castles'), our relationships, our health, or just being alive.

But, nothing is secure in this world! Even stars and planets will be shaken and fall.

Much fell in COVID. It wasn't God-given as such, but as C S Lewis says: 'We can ignore even pleasure. But pain insists upon being attended to. God

whispers to us in our pleasures, speaks in our conscience, but shouts in our pains: it is his megaphone to rouse a deaf world.'

The boat of our security was tipped over, but we've scrambled back in, instead of climbing onto God. We're attempting to rebuild our false hopes, longing for security whilst rejecting God's offer. At the end of Revelation 9, after a long list of the suffering which affects the earth, as caused by sin, it says, in its dramatic and poetic language ... Read Revelation 9:20-21.

The world is broken – and wants to be healed. Again in Revelation we have the saints of God, representing all of God's people who have and do suffer and struggle with the mess of this world, crying out: 'How long, Sovereign Lord ...'. One day it will end – one day it will be enough! Read 2 Peter 3:3-10.

Jesus says we should learn from the fig tree. None of us notice fig trees anymore. But we do notice the decorations in the shops. We know Christmas is near. And we notice the signs on the earth and Jesus' return is getting nearer. We missed Jesus first time, and many continue to ignore him even Christmas, or if remembering him now, then ignoring him for the rest of the year.

So what are we to do? Read 2 Peter 3:11-15.

We are to watch, and be ready. To look to Jesus and be secure in Jesus. Don't be shaken by the events of the world, or be secure in the insecure. Look out for Jesus. A elderly friend of mine belonged to a Christian group who would great each other each morning with the words, 'Do you think he'll come today?

We are to be ready at all times of day and night, and for every day, by living holy, godly, spotless, and blameless lives. That is, to live at peace with Jesus – ensuring he will find room in your heart! And by staying close to Jesus, we are told in 1 Corinthians 1 ⁸ He will also keep you firm to the end, so that you will be blameless on the day of our Lord Jesus Christ.

First Sunday of Advent: Almighty God, give us grace to cast away the works of darkness and to put on the armour of light, now in the time of this mortal life, in which your Son Jesus Christ came to us in great humility; that on the last day, when he shall come again in his glorious majesty to judge the living and the dead, we may rise to the life immortal; through him who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

The Lord's Prayer: Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. Amen.
