Sermon by Robert Hughes: We Live: What kind of life? Read John 3:1-21

Whenever Jesus mentions 'Heaven' he is taking 'the longer view of life; the view from Advent; he is standing back, seeing from a distance. Yet Christmas is the opposite kind of seeing; up-close up and personal. Today's reading calls us to understand living from these two perspectives.

Both the Book of Genesis and the opening of John's Gospel tell us no substance existed before the Creation - only the Spirit of God. We learn the same Spirit brought substance into being and being into substance. We discover that existence is animated and inter-connected by the Spirt of God. Substance and Spirit are inseparable. God's world is a world of mutual dependency. And that principal underpins all of scripture. It brings the fundamental value of mutuality into existence. So to 'love' is to 'serve' the needs of life - one life, many lives, all life. It means taking the side of life.

From a Heavenly perspective, how are we doing with that? Is life prospering? The Bible has things to say about this.

I called the Creation 'a world of mutual dependency'. But when we look doesn't what we see justify the criticisms of humanity we read in the Bible? The human story is surely a history of exceptionalism, not mutual dependence, a story of life built upon falsehood: The first is that we are not connected, not to one another and not to the Earth; 'we are here and everything else is over there, different. A second falsehood is our unassailable sense of personal entitlement that what lies 'out there', exists to serve our own purposes. These two falsehoods on the road of 'exceptionalism' have brought disconnection to the planet, brought it to edge of catastrophe. And, if its effects were somewhat less evident to people in Jesus' lifetime, they are now unmissable wherever we look, - even from space. These are surely signs of a judgement we are bringing down on ourselves. The view from Heaven speaks of our failure to honour our spiritual connections - to 'live by the spirit' in solidarity with all Creation.

Jesus is tells Nicodemus that though we are born in the power of the Spirit, we see ourselves merely as 'flesh born of flesh'. We have not understood we are animated and propelled by The Spirit, that we receive life through the Spirit. We do not acknowledge the inner 'Life within our lives', (which is our true selves); we do not let it 'live'.

Christmas, by contrast, brings a more intimate spiritual perspective. We are moved from 'macro' to 'micro', to the arrival of Jesus in body AND Spirit,

to 'The Christ' the *infant*, the helpless *child*, an image this time encapsulating helpless dependency. The child's mother, Mary, is the perfect emblem of unconditional Love, love that is summoned by need - need at its most evident in the moments after birth.

For little children there is no separation between need and love: Children know their connectedness, they know their need of others; they give their trust first to those who answer it. The love that arrives to rescue and sustain establishes life-long connections, unbreakable bonds. This is the kind of love about which Jesus speaks at length: Not that we loved him, but that first He loved us. God not only knows our needs but provides for them - most often through us! We are to be pro-life, mutual support.

Jesus' concern is not so much that we are 'flesh' but that we are not 'just' flesh. The 'Spirit' is our 'heartbeat and navigator'. Yet we do not hear it's beat and we ignore its compass. We reject dependency. What stands revealed is that CARING for life, for each other, for Creation, is Jesus' foundational call upon our lives.

We might ask, like Nicodemus, 'Where is 'heaven?' Where is this place so familiar to Jesus? (v13). Well, perhaps with the help of the world's most powerful telescopes we can answer that ... or perhaps not. Astronomers say they can see back almost to the first heart beats of Creation - almost to the beginning of existence. And yet 'No one', says Jesus, 'has ever gone there except the One who came from there', Jesus himself. 'Unless they are 'born again.'

'How can someone be born when they are already old?' Nicodemus asks. Jesus replies with an episode from the story of Moses. Moses' people must stick together because there are dangers on their road, 'vipers' along their path. What will keep them confident, united? Moses has a plan, telling his artisans to caste a bronze serpent and fasten it to a pole. And tells his followers: 'If you fear snakes, put your trust in the Spirit of God. Gaze upon this shining Serpent cast in bronze, a symbol of God's authority, and 'LIVE!'

This was done says Jesus, "for the same reason that I am lifted up, so that all who see will see me believe in my strength." (Numbers 21:8.)

Prayers: Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. (Philippians 4:4-6)

- Pray for this day, and the coming week.
- Pray for justice, mercy, peace, and hope.
- Pray for individuals, neighbours, and for family & friends.
- Pray for the Church.
