Opening Prayer: Father God, thank you that you welcome us and love us, wherever we share in this service today. Thank you that we can come as we are and you receive us with grace, and so we offer ourselves to you, both our failures and our joys. We receive your forgiveness and offer our thanks and worship. As we read the Bible today, help us to hear your voice and respond to your love, your encouragements and your commands. Amen

Read: John 20.1-18

RISEN (A summary of Howard's sermon from Easter Day): Such strange times for Jesus' disciples. Everything in their life had been on hold – for 3yrs with Jesus. Now all has gone, Jesus is dead! They are not sure what the future holds but there is no way back to the old life (though Peter makes a try at this – and attempts a return to fishing in John 21). And yet there is a rumour, a hope, a glimmer of light in the dawn of this 'first day of the week'; perhaps the first day of a something new in history. Such strange times for us. Our lives are now on hold, in lockdown and isolation. The old world seems to have gone; vanished. We are not sure what the future holds, and it seems increasingly like we can't go back. Is there any hope for us – any new dawn. As our Bible reading begins '...it was still dark.' And it's still dark for us.

- Jesus understands darkness. The darkness that many feel. It turned dark at the cross and Jesus had spent the previous dark night wrestling with fear and being tormented by the very ones he'd come to save.

- Jesus understands breathlessness - one of the key issues with Covid-19. Crucifixion is regarded as one of the most horrific ways to die, it causes its victims to fight agonisingly for breath until the moment of exhaustion extinguishes life.

- And Jesus understands loss, he wept at Lazarus' tomb, and the Father understands losing a beloved child: '...God so loved the world that he gave his one and only Son, that whoever believes in him shall not perish but have eternal life.' John 3:16.

'Early on the first day of the week, while it was still dark...' It is still dark, but we are not alone in this.



We want to go back to where we came from – but God wants to take us on to something better. Do you remember our Abraham series where we quoted from Hebrews 11 about the ancient saints: 'If they had been thinking of the country they had left, they would have had opportunity to return. Instead, they were longing for a better country – a heavenly one. Therefore, God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them.'

Key to Abraham's walk with God is that he keeps stepping forwards toward God. The Father waits for us, with open arms, longing for us all to return to him wholeheartedly. Let's walk forwards with the God who is with us, whatever the future holds knowing that God understands.

This time will make history – in 100 years' time if Jesus has not yet returned, children will study this in their schools the 2020 pandemic and the new world that emerged.

But nothing has so affected human history as the physical resurrection of Jesus Christ – it has influenced life, society and culture dramatically for good, in the past, in the present and will continue to do so as we live as Kingdom people.

At the first Easter, the disciples didn't know what was next, but God did. Even after the resurrection the disciples didn't know what was next, but God did – and it was sufficient that he told them: 'Receive the Holy Spirit – and I am with you even until the end of the age – now go make disciples. (John 20:21-22)

What is next for us? We don't know – but God does, God understands and invites us to trust him, to hold onto to him, through our own and our world's darkness. To trust him and hold onto him through our own pain and the suffering of others. He says to us: 'Receive the Holy Spirit – and I am with you even until the end of the age – now go, make disciples.' (John 20:21-22 and Matthew 28:19-20)

I want to encourage you to keep reading the Bible, don't ignore the news, but be careful to balance it with the truth of God's Word. Keep praying – speak honestly to God – the Psalms do – express your hurts, your pain, your fear and anger, along with your hope and joy in knowing God has got this.

There is hope with God. He is the one who takes the darkest moment in human history, the slaughter of the one true good and innocent man, who is God, and turns it into the best news we can hear – there is life and hope today. There is more than just the world we see, there are glimpses of heaven today, and the certainty of forever with God in his Kingdom tomorrow.



And be ready. Conversation have already arisen from our families and communities about future, hope and God. A time is coming when there will even more opportunity to share – the reason for the hope we have (1 Peter 3:15). We've been preparing for this – but in any case, however inadequate we feel, Jesus says: Receive the Holy Spirit – and I am with you forever: Now, go make disciples! **Prayers:** I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people – for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. (1 Timothy 2:1-2 NIV)
