To Begin: Grab a Bible, if safe, perhaps light a candle, find a comfortable place and read prayerfully through the service. If you have access to worship music, choose a song and listen to it as you begin or read, or even sing, the song from this Sunday's Service set out below.

Opening Prayer: Father God, thank you that you meet with us where we are and invite us in. Thank you that you receive us with loving kindness. We offer ourselves to you, our failures and our joys. We receive your forgiveness and offer our thanks and worship. As we hear from your word, the Bible, help us to receive your peace and know your joy. Help us, full of your Holy Spirit, to declare your love to the world by our deeds and words to the glory of your name. Amen

Song:

How great the chasm that lay between us, how high the mountain I could not climb.

In desperation, I turned to heaven, and spoke Your name into the night. Then through the darkness, your loving-kindness, tore through the shadows of my soul.

The work is finished, the end is written. Jesus Christ, my living hope.

Who could imagine so great a mercy? What heart could fathom such boundless grace?

The God of ages stepped down from glory, to wear my sin and bear my shame.

The cross has spoken, I am forgiven, the King of kings calls me His own. Beautiful Saviour, I'm Yours forever. Jesus Christ, my living hope.

Hallelujah, praise the One who set me free. Hallelujah, death has lost its grip on me. You have broken every chain, there's salvation in Your name. Jesus Christ, my living hope.

Then came the morning that sealed the promise, your buried body began to breathe.

Out of the silence, the Roaring Lion Declared the grave has no claim on me. Read: Ephesians 1:1-14.

Living in Knowledge of the God who chooses us (a summary of the talk given by Nigel Pink 3rd May):

This letter addressed to the church in Ephesus, is an encyclical letter to the churches of Asia - the region we now know as Turkey. It aimed to exalt the newly converted as to the nature of their salvation and new identity, and how to respond.

Ephesus was the third largest city in the Roman Empire, after Rome and Alexandria and a capital city of its region. The estimated population was 250,000. Ephesus sat on the western coast, bordering the Aegean Sea. But it was not trade as a seaport that drove its economy but visiting worshipers at the Temple to Artemis. As befitting its importance as a major pilgrimage site, the temple was largest structure of its time.

It was normal for pagans to favour one god or goddess over another, whether it be Pan, Apollo or Diana (Artemis). But devotees of one deity did not have to reject the others. Among 'Greeks', nobody questioned pantheism, that is until Christianity.

So early on his letter Paul challenges pantheism by asserting the Jesus is seated: 'far above all rule and authority, power and dominion, and every name that is invoked, not only in the present age but also in the one to come.' (:21)



...and that includes the name of Artemis. But dethroning Artemis was not just a matter of religious devotion; additionally, it meant that would have **Ephesians** their livelihood threatened. One silversmith. Demetrius. who fashioned and sold 'gods' (idols) made this accusation: '...(Paul) says that gods made by human hands are no gods at all. There is danger not only that our trade will lose its good name, but also that the temple of the great goddess Artemis will be discredited; and the goddess herself, who is worshipped throughout the province of Asia and the world, will be robbed of her divine majesty.' (Acts 19:26-27)

Luke then describes an ensuing riot that engulfed the 'whole city'. We should note that asserting that Jesus is Lord is radical challenge to any society, whether first century Ephesus or today in Hampshire!

Yet Paul cannot and does not shirk from his message of truth, 'the gospel of salvation' (v13) for he would have Ephesians stand completely with Jesus. They cannot be for both Jesus and Artemis; Jesus cannot be merely added to the pantheon; just another god to line up with the others — he is above all others.

Today's passage includes a threepoint prayer of thanksgiving for this sure and certain knowledge of the inheritance. That all completely understand:

The Hope: I pray that the eyes of your heart* may be enlightened in order that you may know the hope to which he has called you, the riches of his glorious inheritance in his holy people... (v18)

(*Nb. This odd phrase opthalmous tes kardia is an Hebraism, the heart being for Paul the seat of understanding - challenging the Greek concept of mind and reason - see Job 34:10; Job addresses his friends as 'men of understanding', literally 'men of heart'.)

God's power: '...and his incomparably great power for us who believe. That power is the same as the mighty strength he exerted when he raised Christ from the dead and seated him at his right hand in the heavenly realms.' (:19-20)

Jesus' community: '...and (that) God placed all things under his feet and appointed him to be head over everything for the church, which is his body, the fullness of him who fills everything in every way.' (:22-23) For Paul, he wanted to emphasise that these pagan believers were recipient of a radical transformation. They did not adopt or choose Jesus, Jesus chose them. They did not craft Jesus like a new statue; rather, Jesus fashions them from the inside out in his resurrection image.

And for us today, is Jesus a mere addition to the idols of our lives? Do we make Christianity a lifestyle choice? Or, perhaps we are 'sort of' Christian, placing our faith on a continuum between unbelief and belief? Or that we praise Jesus in church, but keep our faith discrete from other areas of our lives?

Conclusion: If we worship Jesus as Lord, we are necessarily changed people. And this is not notional; faith requires our whole hearts - we have to be all in! Being Christian is therefore not a pretence but a metamorphosis; moreover, we must not underestimate the power that causes this radical transformation. It is the very same power that not only conquers death but brings about the resurrection of Jesus as the first born of a totally new creation. Paul wants everyone to realise that Christian is regenerated an individual miracle, and this so that we may live out their lives with some vague hopefulness, but in full and certain knowledge of the Hope, who is Jesus Christ

Prayers: I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people – for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. (1 Timothy 2:1-2 NIV)

Pray for individuals, for neighbours, for family and friends

Pray for the Church



A prayer for all those affected by coronavirus: Keep us, good Lord, under the shadow of your mercy.
