1. Obey

Obedience to God is less a feeling and more an act of deliberate will. John is quite clear in this letter that knowing God requires obeying his commands. What happens is that when we know God we begin to obey his commands. As we mature in our Christian faith, we try to increasingly form our life in obedience to God.

John says Christians obey Jesus. He says that whoever strives to do this is reaching perfection. Well, there isn't one of us who would remotely claim to be perfect. What he is saying perhaps is we are bringing ourselves towards completion in God – being more the people God made us to be and wants us to be - as we obey.

We need to learn to obey. How do we obey? We pray, we read our Bibles, we sit in silence listening for God, we talk to others, we read books about God, we notice his work in others and nature and around us, and we are inspired and moved and through all these things we come to know who God is. When we know who God is, then we want to obey.

John says that Christians are obedient. Perhaps another way of looking at the idea of obedience coming to know enough about God to accept that God knows best and I freely choose to walk the path that God has set out before me.

Jesus Obeyed God. Jesus sets us the example of giving up his free will in order to be someone and do something that is significant to the work of God. In the Garden of Gesthemene he chooses to obediently take up his cross He says: "My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from Me; yet not as I will, but as You will." (Matthew 26:39)

Knowing God and obedience seem to be closely linked.

John says that we will know if we are Christians and if we are growing in our Christian life, if we are obedient to a God who we know, in a close way – some of us call this having a personal relationship with Jesus. Because we talk to God, and listen to him, we obey him and because we obey him we come to know him more.

2. Imitate

When we obey God, know God and abide in him we come to imitate him. Obedient Christians walk just as Jesus walked. When we obey we walk just as Jesus walked, says John. Jesus' big commandment was to love one another. "As I have loved you, so you must love one another" (13:34 NIV).

John says this is not a new commandment- it has always been in the Jewish law, Jesus would have taught it himself as a Rabbi, but John says Jesus brings to it a deeper, richer meaning. Disciples are to love in the same measure as Christ has loved- with selfless, self-sacrifice.

We may feel that we are required to love others in our lives. And it may be that loving them feels like a burden that requires our time, energy and resources. Loving others today may require giving things up and laying things down that we hold dear – some hopes for the future, some projects we had held dear. Loving others may require more than we were really want to give. Jesus commands us, to the best of our ability, to imitate him and to love others. He says "Turn from your selfish ways, take up your cross daily, and follow Me." (Luke 9:23) We can choose to do our best to know and obey Jesus and love others.

3.Love

What is a Christian? John says a Christian is someone who knows God. God is part of their life. A Christian obeys God's commands, walks with Jesus on both the smooth and the rocky roads, on the mountaintops and in the valleys. A Christian loves others when it is a wonderful experience and also when love requires sterner stuff and a Christian is someone who walks in the light – in a loving and right relationship with God.

John challenges us to do our best each day to obey God, Imitate Jesus and love others and to grow in our knowledge of God who loves us.

Prayers: Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. (Philippians 4:4-6)

- Pray for this day, and the coming week.
- Pray for justice, mercy, peace, and hope.
- Pray for individuals, neighbours, and for family & friends.
- Pray for the Church.
