#### The Sermon by Timothy James.

## Read Psalm 97 and Luke 1:46-55 - The Lord Reigns

Psalm 97 begins with a bold declaration of truth: **"The Lord reigns!"**. In a world full of uncertainty and shifting appearances, this psalm does not invite us to *feel* our way to faith, but to *see* reality through the lens of divine kingship. Faith begins not with perception, but with praise.

The psalm reads like a royal proclamation. Its truth does not depend on human agreement. It is not a proposal for debate, nor the expression of a tribe's private devotion. This is a public, global, and present reality: God is King, not just of "us," but of all nations, whether they acknowledge Him or not.

This reign is not like that of earthly rulers, who rise to power by birth, conquest, or politics. Psalm 97 reveals a rule grounded in **righteousness** and **justice**; not arbitrary power, but moral order. These are not secondary attributes of God's rule; they are the very foundation of His throne. Unlike unjust authorities, God does not merely wield power; He reigns *rightly*, and calls all creation into the joy and discipline of His rule.

This is commanding language: God declares His rule, not to suggest or inform, but to call forth a response: rejoicing, trembling, allegiance, and moral discernment. But it is also covenantal language. This Psalm is not only a call to reverence, it is an invitation to **relationship**. This King does not simply reign from afar, though his glory is manifest in creation (vv.4–5), his truth is made known through justice (v.2), and his power is seen in the fall of idols (v.7). He speaks not merely to command, but to *draw near*. As J. I. Packer puts it, "God speaks to initiate fellowship." The purpose of divine kingship is not fear, but communion.

This is why the ethical turn in verse 10 is so crucial: "You who love the Lord, hate evil." God's self-disclosure is both personal – He wants to be known as He is – and moral – He reveals His justice to draw us into His

likeness. Moral life is not a burden but a response to love; it is how allegiance to, and love for, the King is shown.

The New Testament deepens this vision. The **Magnificat** in Luke 1 mirrors Psalm 97: both proclaim God's justice not just for the few, but for all peoples and generations. They both imagine a world reordered under God's rule, where the proud fall and the humble are lifted. In **Mark 1:15**, which we were reading last September, Jesus announces that the kingdom of God has come near, fulfilling what Psalm 97 long declared. And in **Philippians 2**, which we studied last May, it is proclaimed that this reign will one day be fully acknowledged by every creature.

So how should we respond? Psalm 97 calls us to *rejoice*, like Mary did, because God's justice is not just a dream but a dawning reality. It calls us to *resist evil*, not only personally, but in our world: to oppose injustice, idolatry, and deceit. And it calls us to *proclaim His kingship* publicly—not hiding faith away, but declaring God's reign with conviction and hope.

We live between the psalm's proclamation and its final fulfilment, trusting that the day is coming when the kingdoms of this world will become the kingdom of our God and of His Christ (Revelation 11:15).

6<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Trinity: Merciful God, you have prepared for those who love you such good things as pass our understanding: pour into our hearts such love toward you that we, loving you in all things and above all things, may obtain your promises, which exceed all that we can desire; through Jesus Christ your Son our Lord, who is alive and reigns with you, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, now and for ever. Amen.

**The Lord's Prayer:** Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours now and forever. **Amen.**
