The Sermon

From Jane Hughes – Family Worker:

What does Love look like? Think about how you might answer this question for the relationships you have. It might look like a smile, an act of kindness, etc.

Read through Romans 5:6-8 focussing on verse 6 and reflect on the question: what does God's love look like?

God acted first, he searched for us, (Luke 19:10) he didn't wait for us to change: 'while we were still sinners Christ died for us.' Think again of your first list of what we think love is, we can love because he first loved us. This love from God is so unlike human love which can be conditional or inconsistent – depending on our circumstances or how we are feeling. God's love is certain, unconditional, unshakable, strong, and powerful, unwavering.

And God didn't just say he loved us, he demonstrated sacrificial love for us. The test of any love is how much it is willing to give, by that standard God's love for us is immeasurable.

Paul, so certain of God's love listed 17 things that cannot separate us from the Love of Christ – see Romans 8:35-39.

Jesus was willing to give his time, energy, reputation, status and very life for us. What is our response to that perfect love?

As Jane has reminded us, God in love comes to seek and save us (Luke 19:10). We are challenged to respond to this love, and in responding, we are challenged to seek him and his Kingdom (Matthew 619-34).

In verses 19-21, we are challenged about our securities and investments. This is not a reckless abandonment of our responsibility to take care of ourselves and our dependants, but a challenge about the location of our security.

Our society encourages us to have sufficient funds for retirement, and savings for a rainy day, but if this becomes our security then we have invested unwisely, as this money will not fit us for life in the presence of God, that is, the Kingdom of Heaven today or in the future.

We are encouraged to invest in the Kingdom funds. This means building reserves of love and trust in God. Building a depth of relationship with the Father that will enable us to say, 'I know him and he knows me.'

What might this look like in practice? It means studying the Bible and prayer, it means serving (as an act of worship) in love in our daily lives through generosity to others.

In verses 22-27 we are further challenged to fix our eyes on Jesus and glory (Hebrews 12:2). In this world our gaze can wander to all sorts of other 'glories'. These might be our own glory, the recognition and respect of others, the 'shiny' material things of our age, or luxury lifestyle experiences.

Where is our gaze fixed? Philippians 4: 8 says: 'Finally, brothers and sisters, whatever is true, whatever is noble, whatever is right, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is admirable – if anything is excellent or praiseworthy – think about such things.'

For many in our world their gaze is fixed on money and Jesus is quite blunt about how we cannot serve both God and money. Jesus is not condemning money, but is giving a stark warning about obsessing about and serving, it, for it is a cruel master.

In verses 25-34, we challenged about trust. Jesus encourages us to trust God and not worry about material possessions. We are in a society that is fixated with image. So much is marketed to us on the basis that we can be the person of our own dreams.

It's hard to trust God in our society, but then it has always been so. We are called to fix our eyes again and again on Jesus, to seek his Kingdom and his presence, for nothing else will satisfy. God has a dream for who we should be and it is, that we would be conformed to the likeness of Jesus (Romans 8:29-30). And that requires a new set of priorities, a change of security, a new place to look, and the glory of God to pursue.

Prayers: Rejoice in the Lord always. I will say it again: rejoice! Let your gentleness be evident to all. The Lord is near. Do not be anxious about anything, but in every situation, by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, present your requests to God. (Philippians 4:4-6)
